NEWS BRIEFS

EXCHANGE PROGRAMME BETWEEN THE POLISH POLICE ACADEMY AND UNIVERSITY OF LIMPOPO (UL)

Prof Roelofse successfully negotiated with the Polish Police Academy for an exchange programme between the Academy and UL. The Polish Police, submitted an application based on a Memorandum of Understanding (MoU) for funding from the Erasmus Mundus Scholarships, which has subsequently been granted. Prof Roelofse will visit Poland before the end of the year after which three Polish delegates will be sent to South Africa.

RESEARCH TRIP TO EUROPE

Prof Anthony Minnaar, Research Professor in the Department of Criminology & Security Science at UNISA, recently spent three months of his Sabbatical Research Leave in Europe using Ljubljana in Slovenia as his base. While there he performed interviews and arranged with various Private Security Industries in Eastern European countries to complete a survey questionnaire on “*An investigation into the competencies and skills required for a security manager in the private security industry*” as part of a broader research project titled: The further professionalisation of security officers: Eastern Europe.

While in Ljubljana he was also hosted by the Faculty of Criminal Justice and Security at the Ljubljana Campus of Maribor University, and gave a series of lectures to the Faculty’s students (1st year to masters levels) on a range of topics with a South African focus, inter alia on SAPS transformation since 1994; community policing in SA, corruption and organised crime; researching crime control policies; the SA private security industry and its regulation; and cybercrime.

During April he attended and presented a paper at the 7th Biennial Surveillance & Society Conference: *Surveillance: Power, Performance and Trust*, hosted by the Surveillance Studies Network (SSN)/Eticas Research & Consulting. The venue for the conference was at the University of Barcelona in Barcelona, Spain from 20-23 April 2016. The topic of his paper was on: *Body-worn video cameras, policing and surveillance: Who is protecting whom?*

The conference itself dealt with numerous other aspects of surveillance occurring in societies across the world touching on such sensitive issues as: privacy on the internet; cellphone tracking; hacktivists and whistleblowing; street level surveillance; state security and surveillance; border control and surveillance; surveillance and refugees; the use of private drones in public/private spaces; CCTV surveillance; cyberspace and surveillance; ‘Big’ data exploitation; search engines and data mining,

and many more interesting topics on the broad concept of surveillance and the panopticon of continuous observation of citizens.

At the end of April Prof Minnaar was invited to present a paper: *Cybersecurity and organised crime: Cyberattacks and the ('getting more') organised cybercriminals*, to a seminar organised by the Dipartimento di Giurisprudenza/Laboratorio interdisciplinare di studi sulla mafia e la alter forme di criminalità, Università degli Studi di Ferrara (Department of Jurisprudence/Centre of Interdisciplinary Studies on the Mafia and other forms of Organised Crime) at the University of Ferrara in Ferrara, Italy.

In mid-May Prof Minnaar travelled by bus down to Dubrovnik in Croatia where he gave a lecture titled: *Multiple victimisation: The impact of (the 2008) xenophobic violence in South Africa*, to the World Society of Victimology (WSV) XXXII International Post-Graduate Course on Victimology, Victim Assistance & Criminal Justice hosted at the Inter-University Centre in Dubrovnik, Croatia, 9-22 May 2016.

Coincidentally while in Dubrovnik he did a two-hour walking tour of the old city walls and for those interested the old city and adjacent castle, as well as the monastery on Lokrum Island five kilometres off the old harbour and reachable by ferry, are locations for some of the scenes for the TV series Game of Thrones!

All in all Prof Minnaar reports that research wise he spent a fruitful and productive Sabbatical in Europe.

Magadze, T.O. (2016). *A study of the participation of Vhembe district community corrections forum (CCF) members in the re-integration of ex-offenders into the community*. DPhil Criminology. (Supervisor: Prof C.J. Roelofse; Co-supervisor: Dr. C.E. Oliver).

ABSTRACT

His PhD thesis, "A study of the participation of Vhembe district Community Corrections Forum (CCF) members in the re-integration of ex-offenders into the community" provided an extensive study of community members' involvement in reintegration of ex-offenders into society. Currently, South Africa is facing a high rate of crime and many of these offenders are repeat offenders or recidivists. The research focused on the role of CCFs and the way these structures should be involved in the offender rehabilitation process, placements and monitoring ex-offenders once released. The thesis recommends that CCF members should be consulted in the Offender Rehabilitation Path development before offenders are recommended for parole. CCFs

should furthermore be consulted in the pre-release decision criteria applied by the Parole Board. The thesis also calls for the incorporation of traditional leaders in ex-offender placement. The recommendations further concentrated on statutory adjustments to formalise the role of CCFs and to empower them through adequate resourcing. This thesis uncovered that in order for DJCS to be successful they need to address the issue of stigmatisation which leads to labelling of ex-offenders by communities. The CCFs as a liaison structure between, DJCS, ex-offenders and communities can serve a vital role in destigmatisation and finding support such as accommodation and employment for ex-offenders.

DEPARTMENT OF POLICE PRACTICE, UNIVERSITY OF SOUCH AFRICA

Mabaso, T.B. (2016). *The implications of improvements on road-transport for the Tshwane metropolitan police*. MTech Policing. (Supervisor: Mr. M.M. Matlala).

An improved road and public transport system also referred to in this research as road-transport, is strategic to economic growth in countries worldwide. This is why the improvement relating thereto have been prioritised by governments in developing economies such as South Africa. The problem that therefore informed this study is that since improvements were made on road-transport in South Africa, the implications thereof on the role of the Tshwane Metropolitan Police Department have not been studied. The point of the latter is to understand dynamics relating to how the road-transport improvements have swayed the role of law enforcement in the City of Tshwane. In order to unpack these dynamics, the study posed the question: What are the implications of the road-transport improvements on the role of the Tshwane Metropolitan Police Department? In an attempt to answer this question, the study premised itself on exploring one primary aim, which is: to explore the implications of the road-transport improvements, on the role of the TMPD. To operationalise this aim, the study used three research objectives, which are: to describe the road transport in South Africa; to explain the role of the TMPD; as well as to identify factors that hinder the effectiveness of the TMPD. The research used a qualitative approach wherein data was collected using primarily interviews. Similarly the research showed that road-transport improvements in South Africa can be summarised into two categories. These are traffic improvements and improvements in public transport. Likewise, the research found that the role of TMPD includes traffic policing, by-law enforcement, crime prevention, crime investigation and crime crowd management. Although such role is regulated properly, the study shows that the TMPD was constrained by a number of challenges that include: lack of clarity in their crime prevention mandate; limited investigative powers; balancing the enforcement; crime prevention mandates; training; staff shortages; resource problem; and administrative challenges. To deal with the problems thus requires strong management and leadership within the institution.

Mfusi, B.F. 2016. *The policing of road rage incidents in the Gauteng province*. MTech Policing. (Supervisor: Prof M. Montesh).

ABSTRACT

This study followed a qualitative research approach, and semi-structured interviews regarding the subject matter were conducted with knowledgeable and experienced respondents in the Gauteng traffic-related departments. A literature review was also conducted to provide a comprehensive understanding of the research problem in both the local and international context.

The research stresses the fact that motorists are continuing to lose their lives on Gauteng province roads, as a result of violent traffic disputes, therefore people suffer financial, physical, psychological as well as social effects as a consequence of such actions. The findings revealed that all the traffic management stakeholders are working cooperatively towards implementing crime prevention strategic plans. However, there is no specific strategy in place for the policing of road rage. In addition, this study reveals that it is insurmountable for traffic police officials to curb road rage incidents because the latter occur as a result of unpredictable human behaviour.
